
Flora

In October we should be seeing: Dogwood, Flat-weed, Grey Ironbark, Mugga Ironbark, Narrow-leafed, Ironbark, Narrow-leaved Grey Gum, River Mangrove, Weeping Tea-tree, White Clover, Yapunyah, Yellow-box, White Mahogany, Tallowwood and Red Bottlebrush.

Practical Day (Members only)

Our next practical day is on Sunday the 9th of October. Venue will be Wayne Rossiter's property which is adjacent to Pine Mountain Hall.

The day will be a hands on learning day directed at new beekeepers. The focus will be on re-queening and Nuc formation. If you purchase one you will need to take it with you on the day. The day will commence with Morning tea at 10.00am and finish up with a sausage sizzle lunch. Member Survey

Thanks to everyone who completed our very first "survey", we had approximately 90 members respond, regarding changing our insurance, updating our website and establishing a Facebook page. Based on the information received the committee has determined;

- To leave the current insurance as is.
- To further investigate the establishment of a Facebook page.
- To update the current website to a more usable format.

Just to further clarify the questions around changing the Club's insurance. It had been raised at the Committee that some other clubs hold insurance which provides cover to individual bee keepers (ours does not). We sought member feedback on whether to explore this option, bearing in mind it would likely cost the club about \$1800 more per annum, which every member would have to cover by an increase in membership fees. In addition, if the majority of members agreed to take up the insurance, they would have to pay a further \$100 per annum each for the individual policy. In the end, there did not seem to be sufficient interest from members to pursue this further at this time.

Website

Following on from the survey feedback and the committee's approval, I have now updated our website. After a few late nights and a bit of hair pulling I have created a new look and feel, and updated the content. The site is much easier to navigate and hopefully a bit clearer. I would welcome any feedback and suggestions for content for the new site.

Spring Management

Spring is one of the most important times in the Apiary. If you want to have healthy strong colonies, Spring is the time to start work.

On a warm sunny day with a light wind and enough day left to let your bees warm up again before sundown, open your hives. (Hint: if you need a jacket it's too cold.)

- 1) Check the health of your hives, in particular check for AFB.
- 2) Check to see if you have a Queen by finding her or evidence she is laying.
- 3) Check to see if there is honey (food) for your bees. Consider if and when you need to rob them as part of your swarm management. More hives are lost to starvation at this time than any other reason)
- 4) Look for signs of swarming, ie Queen cells mostly along the low parts of the frames.
- 5) Make space for your bees to allow the colony to grow. Consider raising brood to the super or adding supers.

Details of all these tips and how to manage your hives in Springtime can be found in "The Bee Book" by Peter Warhurst and Roger Goebel. There are copies in our club library if you don't have one. If you are new to beekeeping and not sure of what to do in spring, ask us, we can help.

Nucleus (Nuc) Hives

Club nucleus hives are \$85.00 each with a marked Queen, bees and 5 frames. The Nuc boxes must be returned promptly. Note: *If you order a nucleus hive, please ensure you are prepared for its arrival. Shortly after you will need a full size box that has been dipped and painted as well as frames with foundation to make up the appropriate number of frames to fill the hive. This is the minimum you would need, please talk to us if you have any doubts about what else you require.*

Vale Rudy Guerin

Rudy Guerin passed away a few hours after the September club meeting succumbing to cancer at the age of 61.

Rudy was a larger than life character and first came to Australia from France in the 1970s taking out Australian citizenship shortly thereafter. Rudy returned to France for a while where he met and married Lydie and then after the birth of his two sons returned to Australia in 1991.

Those who became acquainted with Rudy in recent times might be surprised to learn that he began his working career as a ballet dancer and performed in France, England and Germany and toured throughout Europe and in his first stint in Australia performed with what is now the Queensland Ballet.

On his return to France he took up installing heating systems, training in both plumbing and electrical work and in Australia worked in Restaurants, joined the Army Reserve, qualified and worked as a Commercial Diver and Underwater Welder, worked on boats and rigs, became a Registered Builder and was employed as a Technical Manual Interpreter and Writer on a proposal for a large World Bank funded dam project in New Caledonia.

In the early part of this century and partly on the strength of his manual writing experience, Rudy then turned himself in a project manager on large earthworks projects first in New Caledonia and for ten years or so on earthworks and civil works on large mining projects in Africa, always going onto bigger and better things.

Rudy got into Bees in the late 1990's firstly helping me out and then as he did with everything he touched, going it alone with gusto. He had a lull for a while due to his work in Africa but took it up again about four years ago with even more gusto than before and suggested we both join the I&WMBA. He enjoyed the club and club events and even when quite ill made a special effort to attend meetings.

One of his last requests was to be listed as an apology for the September meeting. Rudy greatly appreciated the fellowship of, and help from, club members and in particular of his "mentor" Ian Workman.

US beekeepers fear for livelihoods as anti-Zika toxin kills 2.5m bees

Huddled around their hives, beekeepers around the south-eastern US fear a new threat to their livelihood: a fine mist beaded with neurotoxin, sprayed from the sky by officials at war with mosquitos that carry the Zika virus.

Earlier this week, South Carolina beekeepers found millions of dead honey bees carpeting their apiaries, killed by an insecticide. A video posted by a beekeeper to Facebook showed thousands of dead bees heaped around hives, while a few survivors struggled to move the bodies of fellow bees.

In another Facebook post, South Carolina hobbyist Andrew Macke wrote that he had lost "thousands upon thousands of bees" and that the spraying had devastated his business. "Have we lost our mind," he wrote, "spraying poison from the sky?"

The program head, Dr Mike Weyman, said that though South Carolina has strict rules about protecting pollinators, county officials were using the neurotoxin, Naled, under a clause exempting them in a "clear and public health crisis". More than three dozen people have tested positive for Zika in South Carolina, Weyman said, and officials have made it a priority to prevent local transmissions through the *Aedes aegypti* mosquito.



"We don't want one of those mosquitos having a blood meal on an individual we've already determined was positive," Weyman said. "We know beyond a shadow of a doubt that [Zika] is up and running in Florida. If it gets in the mosquito population ... you're playing catch-up."

South Carolina's protocol for Zika infections is to alert local officials of a carrier's residence, which they "consider a ground zero", Weyman said. Local authorities then target the local mosquitos in a 200-yard radius, in this case with spray.
