Flora. In August we should be seeing

Broad-Leaved Ironbark, Flat Weed, Hairy Bush Pea, Mountain Coolibah, Grey Ironbark, Mugga Ironbark, Narrow-Leaved Ironbark, White Clover, Yapunyah, Turnip Weed, Wattle, Blue Gum, Spotted Gum, Red Bottle Brush.

Know your Flora- Passion Fruit.

Thought this would be an interesting plant for August. Our vines both have lots of flowers and the bees love them. Passiflora edulis is a climbing woody perennial in lots of varieties. A vigorous climbing vine with fast-growing canes. Leaves are deeply lobed, glossy, dark green above and paler, dull green below, to 7.5–20 cm long. White flowers are single, fragrant, 5–7.5 cm at each node on new growth. Flowers are sterile in the purple varieties and must be insect pollinated, as the pollen is too large and sticky for wind pollination. Managed honeybees, while not as effective as large bees, are needed in large numbers to successfully pollinate. Fruit is round to ovoid, 3.5 to 7.5 cm wide, with a tough



smooth, waxy skin, dark purple to pale yellow with a very appealing juicy pulp, with a guava-like sweet–tart flavour. Origin: South America. Love full sun but is susceptible to frost. Bees collect both pollen and nectar for flowers.




Honey Buckets, Bottles and Jars

Hunt for an Asian Queen

The hunt is on for a single Queen bee that has the potential to cause big problems for the agricultural sector in the Top End. The Asian honeybee is a notifiable pest in the Northern Territory.

The Queen was part of a hive that was discovered in a campervan being trucked from Cairns to Darwin. The bees **can** carry the destructive Varroa mite, however tests carried out on the destroyed hive show the mite was not present.

"If she's here we need to find her and we need to eradicate her. We need to do it as quickly as we can". Stephen West, chief plant health manager for the Northern Territory Department of Primary Industry and Fisheries (DPIF). 'The mites, which attach themselves to bees and suck their blood can cause diseases and viruses, and are known to kill entire bee colonies and spread to others".

"It's a matter of how that journey went for the Queen, what condition she was in when they arrived, and that swarm that's moved off with her, the strength of those bees as well, and how quickly they can find a food source.

Stephen West, said biosecurity staff in Darwin killed the swarm of Asian honeybees, but the Queen was nowhere to be found.

"Australia is one of the last remaining countries in the world that does not have Varroa mite."

Mr West said an Asian honeybee population has been established in Cairns since 2007 but ongoing biosecurity efforts have prevented their spread into the Northern Territory.

He said the Asian honeybees are more aggressive than the European honeybee that most Australians are familiar with. "Their swarms will move into places such as letter boxes. They'll move into hollows and take the place of bird nesting spots and possums."

The Small Hive Beetle removed from the notifiable pests list is South Australia

The insect has been removed from the notifiable pests list in South Australia, meaning no more hive movement restrictions aiming to curb the spread of the pest will be enforced.

Currently, there are no eradication techniques for small hive beetle, but Biosecurity South Australia said it could be managed. The decision to remove the beetle from the notifiable pest species list was swayed by the cost of maintaining movement restrictions for hives and evidence the bug was already well established in South Australia. Nick Secombe, from Biosecurity SA, said while the beetle could cause large problems for apiarists, there was a chance the lack of hot and humid conditions would limit its impact.

"We know it's in the Riverland. We found it at nine apiaries across about a 15-kilometre area in the Riverland," he said. "It's a very cryptic pest. It's very hard to find because the little beetles scurry away when you open up the hive and hide. "The cool weather just doesn't suit the pest quite so well and we think that the cooler, drier conditions in South Australia will also work against it.

"It will certainly survive and we expect that it will spread, but we are reasonably hopeful that the impact will be similar to what we see in Victoria, where the well managed hives can go a long way toward managing it." Now that the small hive beetle is no longer a notifiable pest, those from areas with outbreaks are free to move their hives, particularly across the Victorian/South Australian border.

President of the South Australian Apiarists Association Ben Hooper said the industry was consulted by Primary Industries and Regions South Australia about the decision.

He said while he supported the choice, some beekeepers would be disappointed with the decision.
