


Honey Buckets, Bottles and Jars

Articles Manuka Buzz



Beekeepers abuzz with excitement over research into Manuka honey possibilities. A detailed study has found at least 80 varieties of bush and trees around Australia that assist bees in making the Manuka honey sought-after for its medicinal qualities.

New Zealand is the main supplier of Manuka honey, which fetches about \$100 per kilogram. Beekeepers producing everyday honey for the breakfast table get between \$5.50 and \$7.00/kg. However, as demand for Manuka honey escalates, the Kiwis are unlikely to be able to provide

sufficient supplies. James Kershaw is a New South Wales-based beekeeper, and is the industry representative on the research committee that is part of the study funded by the Rural Industries Research and Development Corporation and honey producers.

"We've come across it [Manuka] in years before and it would get stuck in the combs," Mr Kershaw said. "We would curse it because you cannot get it out of the comb. It was a pain in the butt. "Now it could be a possibility that some extra income will come out of it."

The optimism is based on a study that has looked at honey from Leptospermum trees, better known as tea trees and jelly bush. Microbiologist Dr Shona Blair, from the University of Technology Sydney, is involved in the research and is on the executive of the New South Wales Apiarist Association. Just how Manuka honey helps fight disease is still being determined.

Bee's Knees

Former miner finds making honey in the outback is bee's knees

It has taken half a decade for 66-year-old hobby apiarist Peter Rawlins to resurrect his childhood dream of making honey.

But he is not doing it alone — in the backyard of his weatherboard house on the outskirts of Broken Hill, up to 80,000 bees now reside in a metropolis of hives that gently hum in the shade of the trees.

"I come from Cadell on the Murray in South Australia and there used to be a lot of beekeepers around in those days, back in the '60s," Mr Rawlins said. "An old bloke was getting on and he needed a hand. "I was interested, so I used to go over and a couple of



years later I had a couple of hives of my own." Life got in the road of Mr Rawlins' enthusiasm for bees; he married, raised a family and moved north, where he slaved in the honeycomb of the Broken Hill mines. Just under five years ago, he got the bee bug back, and it did not take long for him to become known by locals as "the bee guy". "As soon as I started, I had a couple of hives, people heard I had bees, so I had the school ringing me saying 'come and get this swarm for us before they get the kids'," Mr Rawlins said. Now, each day he dresses in his "bee suit" — white pants and boots, long gloves and a white hoodie with a barrier of mesh draped across his face.

He fires up the smoke machine which he said calmed the angry bees.

"The theory is that they think there's a bushfire coming, so they go inside the hive and gorge themselves with honey instead of wanting to sting you," Mr Rawlins explained. "The smoker is started up with a piece of paper and some straw, but generally I like to use hessian or eucalyptus leaves [because] it's a nice smell and it makes a nice cool smoke."

He said cool smoke or not, it was the weather that could really make the bees cranky. "If the weather's wrong or you've got the wrong perfume on, that annoys them a bit," he said. "Cold weather, windy weather — the day that's ideal for them is hot, though it's not ideal for us in these suits. "The face is the worst place to be stung," Mr Rawlins said, wincing at a memory. "The wife had a photo of me at one stage and I looked like the elephant man. I got two stings on the face, but that's my own fault for not having the veil on."

All this peril and pain has a payoff however — honey, and lots of it. "It depends on how strong the hives are; a lot of these were only swarms [and] there could be old queens," he said. "But generally speaking, each frame could hold two to three kilos. You could get 30 kilos out of this one box of frames. "I'm only a backyarder. If I get 60 kilos, I'll probably sell 20 kilos and give away 40."

Broken Hill's distinctive honey flavour

Mr Rawlins said Broken Hill honey had its own distinct flavour, one that was comparatively impossible to describe. "Every area has its own food source for bees, like on the river, you'd have all eucalyptus honey," he said. "Up on some of

the fruit blocks, you'd have orange blossom honey. "But Broken Hill's generally a blended honey, as everyone's backyard has got something different and the bees go up to five to seven kilometres to get a feed."

"You go through the stage of women and drinking, cars and all that type of thing, but later on in life, you start thinking 'there's more to life than that'," he said.

"The bees are very entertaining; I can sit and watch them for hours."
